
In recent years, news of people moving to tiny houses have circulated the media.

From a family of 4 in a 196-square foot trailer house, to a single man living in a cozy 83-square foot cabin, these stories show it's possible to live in smaller dwellings while reducing expenses.









#### What is the Tiny Home Movement?

Time Magazine<sup>1</sup> states the concept describes efforts by architects, activists and frugal homeowners to craft beautiful, highly functional houses with a smaller space. For them, it's a practical response to soaring housing costs and shrinking incomes.


#### Just how small is a tiny home?

A house is usually considered "tiny" when it is between 80 to 400-square ft.<sup>2</sup>




