## Idioms

1. Under the weather : not feeling well

Example) I have been under the weather all week.



- 1. Come down with (something) : to become sick, suffer from something
- e.g.) I had been coming down with a cold but I am feel better now.



**3. Get a black eye :** to get a bruise or darkened eye after being hit or after bumping into something

e.g.) My friend <u>had gotten a black eye</u> from fighting against a burglar.



**4. Go under the knife :** to have an operation in surgery

e.g.) Doctor: <u>Have you gone under the knife before?</u>

Patient: Yes, I have. It was a knee surgery.



5. Have a physical (examination) : to get a medical check-up

e.g.) I am calling to <u>make an appointment</u> to have a physical examination with Dr. King.

6.Take a turn for the worse : to become sicker

e.g.) My <u>symptoms</u> took a turn for the worse last week and I am now in the hospital.

## Making an appointment

Make an appointment: schedule a time to see the doctor

Information you need to give to the receptionist

- 1. Name
- 2. Symptoms
- 3. Time and date you are available to go to the hospital

## **Conversation with a receptionist**

You usually make an appointment with the receptionist over the phone. Here are some useful phrases you can use

- I would like to make an appointment.
- I have/ feel ----- (symptoms).
- I will be there ------ (date/time) example: tomorrow at 10am

## **Perfect Tenses**


- Verb tenses which show action already completed
- Something that took place prior to the present moment

to a moment in the past

to a moment in the future

## **Present Perfect:**

### Verb tenses which show action already completed



### **Examples of Present Perfect**

# Actions started in the past and continuing in the present.

- She *has worked* in the hospital for five years.
  - We *have had* the same doctor for ten years.
  - Your turn

When the time period referred to has not finished

- I have worked hard this week.
- We *haven't seen* the ophthalmic *today*.

## **Present Perfect continued**

Actions repeated in an unspecified period between the past and now.

• They *have seen* that psychologist six times

• It *has happened* several times already.

• Your turn

Actions completed in the very recent past (+just)

• *Have you just finished* making an appointment?

• We *have just seen* the doctor.

• Your turn

## **Present Perfect continued**

When the precise time of the action is not important or not known

- *Have you seen* 'Greys Anatomy'?
- *She's studied* family medicine, mental health and traditional medicine.
- Your turn

## **Past Perfect**:

For talking about something that happened before something else

Both events happened in the past



## **Examples of Past Perfect**



□ I lost so much weight because I *had begun* exercising.

□ I *had met* the doctor before you recommended him to me.

# **Future Perfect**

- A completed action in the future
- Two forms

### " WILL HAVE DONE"

### "BE

### GOING TO HAVE DONE"


# Will have done

### will have + past participle

• You are going to have been waiting for more than two hours when her surgery is finally complete.

• Are you going to have been talking for more than 2 hours when you tell him you need throat surgery?
